

The orange stars on the map represent kingdoms that Egypt traded goods with. Because Egypt traded with so many kingdoms, the Egyptian economy was able to grow. The green words "Timna Valley" show where one important kingdom was. The Timna Valley is the site of the world's first copper mine! Egyptians bought copper from the Tinma Valley and used it to create tools, like knives, saws, and chisels. Farmers used these tools to grow crops. As a result, they could grow and sell more food, which helped Egypt's economy grow.

Take a look at this map. Look at how the Nile River flows through Egypt. The Nile River was important to ancient Egypt for many reasons. For example, it was an important trade route. Boats would carry goods down the river and stop at cities to buy and sell goods. In addition, land next to the Nile River was very fertile. This meant that Egyptians

could grow food that they could sell to other civilizations.

This photo shows a burial site, also known as a tomb. When people died, they were buried in tombs in Egypt. Egyptologists found artifacts from other kingdoms in the tombs. For example, egyptologists found knife handles from Mesopotamia in an Egyptian tomb. Mesopotamia was about 1,000 miles away from Egypt! The tombs show us that Egyptians traded with people who were far away from them.

This is a granite statue called a sphinx. A sphinx has the body of a lion and the head of a human. The human depicted on this sphinx is Hatshepsut, who was a female Pharaoh in ancient Egypt. While she was the ruler, she helped the Egyptian economy grow. She started trade with people in Punt, an area south of Egypt on the horn of Africa. When Egyptian traders went to Punt, they bought valuable materials, such as gold, perfumes, animal skins, and cinnamon. Traders also took ships across the Red Sea to acquire copper and chemicals.

The picture the left is a weight used to weight metals used as currency. Egyptians and their neighboring kingdoms in places like Greece and Mesopotamia used copper, silver, and gold as currency to pay for goods. However, sometimes, kings in Egypt preferred to take over a neighboring kingdom rather than continue to trade with it. During the First Dynasty, a king led an army against Nubia, located in modern-day southern Egypt and northern Sudan. Nubia was a city that was an important trade center. It had a lot of gold and gold mines.

Later kings would continue to keep a strong Egyptian presence on the border to ensure the safety of the resources and trade routes. Khasekhemwy, the last king of the Second Dynasty of Egypt, led campaigns to Nubia to put down rebellions and secure trade centers and his methods became the standard for the kings who came after him.



Yam was another important trade center to ancient Egypt, but then disappears from the records and is replaced by another called Irem by the time of the New Kingdom (c. 1570 - c. 1069 BCE). The period of the New Kingdom was the time of Egypt's empire when trade was most lucrative and contributed to the wealth necessary to build monuments like the Temple of Karnak, the Colossi of Memnon, and the mortuary temple of Hatshepsut.



Currently, Egypt's top exports include the following: crude petroleum, gold, nitrogenous fertilizers, insulated wire, and citrus. Egypt's top export destinations are the United Arab Emirates, Italy, Turkey, the United States, and Germany. This graph shows that Egypt exports over \$20 billion worth of goods to the U.S. and also imports about \$20 billion worth of goods each year.



Currently, Egypt's top imports include the following: wheat, gas, iron, cars, and sugar. Egypt's top import destinations are China, Russia, Germany, the United States, and Italy. This graph shows that Egypt imports mostly food and machinery from the U.S.
