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Creating a Youtube Episode

Follow the steps to create your Youtube episode.

Step 1: Choose an Audience

Your first step is to choose who your audience will be. The audience is the group of people who will be watching your episodes. You can choose one or more audiences. You can select or or multiple audiences. Circle your audience.

• Kids ages 5-9

Evidence:

- Teens ages 13-15
- Historians or other professionals
- People of all ages who are visually impaired or hearing impaired
- Teachers of 3rd-5th graders
- People who think that everyone thought the Transcontinental Railroad was amazing
- Other (ask your teacher for permission about choosing a different audience)

Step 2: Discuss the different perspective on the Transcontinental Railroad

Pick two perspectives that you want to discuss on the railroad. Then, make a claim about these perspective. A claim is your opinion, like "All people were happy about the Transcontinental Railroad." A claim is backed up by evidence. Below, write two claims about two different perspectives on the railroad. Then, use the handout to pick at least one piece of evidence that will back up your claim

Step 3: Write an Episode

Your episode must have an opening, middle, and closing.

Opening: An opening is the first thing you will say when you start recording your episode. Middle:
Next, you will state your two claims. Your claims are the main goal of your video. It is what you want your audience to learn or agree with. Then, you should talk about the sources you chose to back up your claims! You can use the sources your teacher gave you, or you can find your own! Write 4 or more sentences that you will say in the middle of your episode.



Closing:
You should tell viewers that the episode is over. You should also tell viewers that there will be more episodes coming soon. You might want to give a "sneak peek" on what you will talk about in another episode! Think about how to make your closing interesting so people will want to watch other episodes. Write 3 or more sentences that you will say for your closing.



How to Record a Youtube Episode Like a Professional

Have Good Eye Contact

Make sure that you are looking at the camera. You should make eye contact and not look down at your notes the whole time.



Speak Loudly

Make sure you talk loudly so the camera's microphone can record your voice. If you talk too quietly, people won't be able to hear you.



Speak Clearly

When people are nervous, they might talk faster than they normally would. Make sure you talk slowly enough so people can understand you. If you're not sure if you're speaking clearly enough, ask a friend to listen to you practice.
