#### Step 1: Choose an Audience

#### Step 2: Choose a Purpose

Writers create cartoons for different purposes. Choose a purpose from the list below.

- Raise awareness about a topic
  - A cartoon can educate people about a topic or event that they might not know about. This type of cartoon can include the following: pictures and facts about a topic, trivia questions, or a link to a webpage where people can find more information about the topic.
- Provide commentary on a topic
  - A cartoon can provide commentary on a topic by showing the writer's opinion on a specific event or topic. For example, a writer can comment on whether he or she agrees with a political candidate.
- Convince people to buy something
  - A cartoon can convince people to purchase a specific product or service. This type of cartoon can include the following information: price for a product or service, description of why people should buy a product or service, reviews from past customers.
- Other
  - If you have another idea for your cartoon's purpose, ask your teacher for approval.

Decide which type of tone your cartoon will have. Remember that the tone of your cartoon should match the event you are covering. For example, it would not be appropriate to use a funny cartoon to explain the events of a war. Circle your choice.

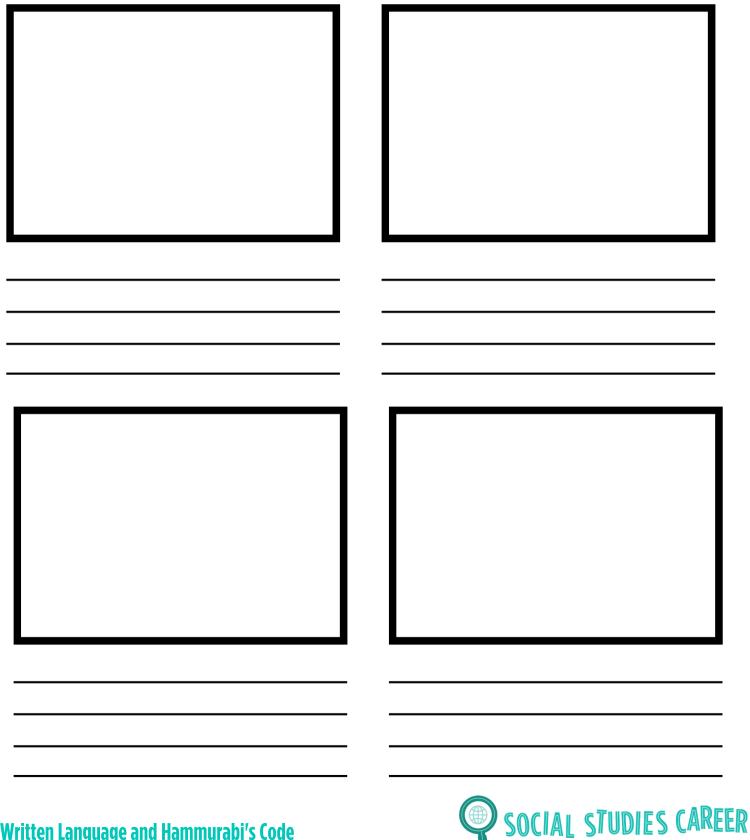

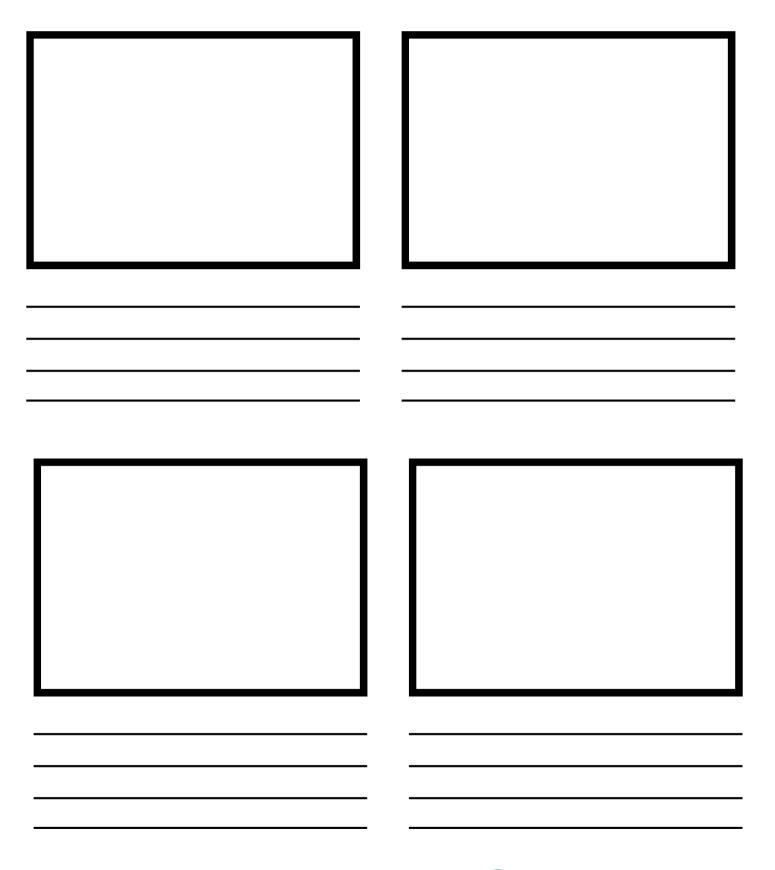
