1. What does an archeologist study?

Archeologists study human behavior and cultures.

1. Why was Mesa Verde made a national park?

To protect the archeological sites of the Ancestral Pueblo people.

- 2. Write at least one way Ancestral Pueblo people used each plant listed below.
  - a. Broadleaf Yucca:

Answers will vary. Examples: Food, soap, shampoo, reduce swelling, make ropes, clothing, blankets, sleeping mats, and baskets.

b. Prickly Pear Cactus:

As food.

c. Utah Juniper:

Berries used for flavoring. Wood used for lumber, plates, and firewood.
