National parks are parks in the United States that have been created by the government. The government created national parks so that it could keep the plants and animals that live in them safe.

Grand Canyon National Park



A national park located in Arizona that was made to protect the Grand Canyon.



LOCATION: Grand Canyon National Park is in Arizona.



Grand Canyon National Park became a state park in 1919.

The park was made to protect the Grand Canyon. The Grand Canyon is a giant rock formation. The Colorado River runs through the Grand Canyon.

HISTORY:

Artifacts have been found that show people have been living in the area for 12,000 years.

Native American tribes such as the Ancestral Pueblo people, Paiute, Navajo, Zuni and Hopi once lived in the area.

In the 1540s, Spanish explorers were the first Europeans to explore the Grand Canyon.

Grand Canyon National Park became an official United States National Park in 1919.

PLANTS:

In Grand Canyon National Park you will see plants like the coyote willow, narrow-leaved paintbrush, globe mallow, or western honey mesquite.











Skip count by 10s.






Skip count by 5s.






